

Greater Pike Community Foundation Announces Establishment of a Major Endowment

Milford, Pike County, PA: The Greater Pike Community Foundation has announced a gift of approximately \$2.3 million from the **Richard L. Snyder Charitable Trust**. At a press conference held today at the Hotel Fauchère, in Milford, PA, Greater Pike board members and community leaders announced the gifts and answered questions from the media.

Richard L. Snyder, a prominent Milford civic leader and businessman died on November 14, 2014. The gift from his charitable trust will be used to establish the Richard L. Snyder Endowment Fund at the Greater Pike Community Foundation.

Income from the Richard L. Snyder Endowment Fund will be distributed annually to not-for-profit organizations within the scope of Snyder's instructions. The amount distributed each year will be determined by the Greater Pike Community Foundation Board of Directors and based on the return on the fund's investments and a formula recommended by Snyder.

"Dick made it clear that not only did he not want the principal distributed, but he wanted a portion of the income to be added to the principal each year, in order for the endowment to keep pace with inflation," noted **Jim Pedranti**, who chairs the Greater Pike Community Foundation board of directors. "It is only the income exceeding any required addition to the principal each year that will be distributed."

Pedranti explained that the amount available each year will vary, but is expected to vary between \$20,000 and \$100,000. The first gifts from the fund are expected to be made in the second quarter of 2016, and an application procedure will be posted on Greater Pike's website by November 1, 2015.

The establishment of the Richard L. Snyder Endowment Fund—believed to be the largest single gift ever made for the benefit of Pike County charitable and not-for-profit organizations—has been lauded as a landmark in the development of long-term civic stewardship for Pike County.

"This milestone gift from Dick Snyder will reverberate for generations, carrying forward Dick's exceptional legacy of generosity and civic engagement" said **John "Duke" Schneider**, Snyder's long-time Milford-based attorney and member of the board of Greater Pike.

"This is a gift from Dick to the entire community, to its future, and it is consistent with Dick's extraordinary long-term vision for what our community can be," said **Maryanne Monte**, who is a Greater Pike board member and has assumed Snyder's previous role as chair of the Milford Enhancement Committee.

Barbara J. Buchanan, who also serves on Greater Pike's board of directors and established Greater Pike's first donor-advised fund, remembered Snyder fondly, "He was a kind man who knew how to get things done. I enjoyed working with him over the years."

"This is an astonishing act of generosity, but I am not surprised. There has been no one more committed to Pike County's future in recent years than Dick Snyder," said **Davis R. Chant**, a long-time friend of Snyder's who also serves on the board of Greater Pike.

"Dick was proud of the Hotel Fauchère and saw it as the centerpiece to the Milford renaissance which he so effectively led," said **Sean Strub**, Snyder's business partner and friend. "Dick wanted to make sure the time and effort and love so many have invested in protecting and improving Milford is continued for many years; his generosity in establishing this endowment will help achieve that goal."

Greater Pike's assets are managed subject to an investment management agreement with The Luzerne Foundation, a Luzerne, PA-based community foundation with more than 305 funds and over \$32 million in assets.

Ann Morey, Snyder's long-time friend, whom he appointed trustee of his charitable trusts, recently accepted an invitation to join the board of the Greater Pike Community Foundation.

A San Diego resident, she has been visiting Milford several times a year since the mid 80s. "I was honored that Dick entrusted me with this responsibility and I am honored and delighted that through my involvement with Greater Pike I will be able to continue my engagement in and support for the Milford community," she said.

Greater Pike Community Foundation's slogan is "For Good. Forever." The foundation was established in 2012 to enable generous individuals, families and local businesses to maximize their charitable support through organized, targeted community philanthropy. Snyder's gift is the largest to date.
